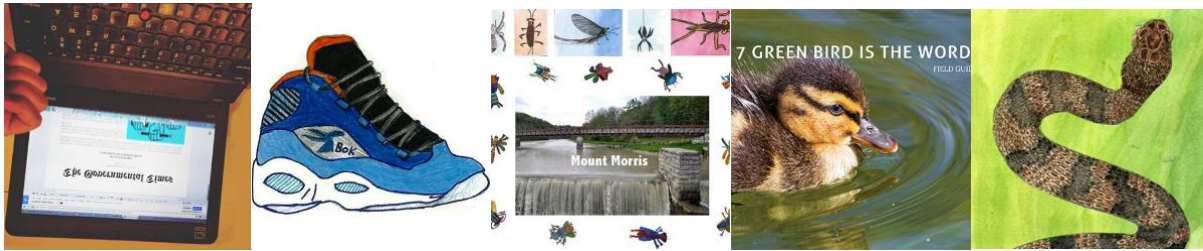


Electronic Formats



More and more schools are making use of free tools for creating and displaying projects online. Here are some current examples.

Project Title	Grade	School	Notes
<u>Bugs Tell a Story: Healthy Habitats along the Genesee River</u>	K-5	Genesee Community Charter School	Students created a website and also used a platform called ThingLink to display their work.
<u>Slithering Snake Stories</u>	2	Conservatory Lab Charter School	Students created an e-book that includes writing, artwork and spoken narration.
<u>Sea Creatures Portraits and Stories</u>	3	Explorer Elementary Charter School	Students created an e-book that includes writing, artwork and spoken narration.
<u>If the Shoe Fits</u>	6	Christa McAuliffe Charter School	Created as a final product of a learning expedition on where our stuff comes from. Students conducted research and devised a social responsibility rubric to inform consumers about company policies.
<u>Bird is the Word</u>	7	Oak Middle School	A multidisciplinary project that resulted in an electronic field guide. Students used Noodle Tools, Notability and Adobe Spark to create their field guide.
<u>Be The Change: A State-wide Literacy Program</u>	7,8	Santa Fe School for the Arts & Sciences	A student-led community-wide literacy campaign resulted in the creation of a program called “Hooked on Books” with its own website.
<u>The Governmental Times: An Op-Ed Blog</u>	12	Metropolitan Expeditionary Learning School (MELS)	A website created by AP US Government and Politics students using a blog-type platform.



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
